Liberty Township governing body and all department heads began working on the 2024 budget in the Fall of 2023. The budget includes the calendar year 2024 as well as planning for future projects. We plan for future projects to avoid unexpected large expenses that may cause increased taxes.

The municipal portion of your tax bill is one of the smallest portions of your tax bill. We at Liberty Township take that small portion and stretch it to cover many services for the needs of our residents. Our Department of Public Works budget covers scheduled and emergency road repairs as well as the acquisition and maintenance of equipment to conduct such road repairs. The municipal portion of your 2024 tax bill also includes expenses for the new state mandated stormwater requirements.

Of course, Liberty Township has also incurred increased operating costs for utilities, supplies, and insurance premiums just like our residents have had to face in your personal expenses.

Liberty Township prides itself for not having a large tax increase, and in 2024 we were faced with an increase of 1.3 cents. This small increase means an approximate annual increase of \$42.00 dollars on a home assessed at \$300,000. As a frugal municipality we have no debt to carry from prior years. In 2024 there is the consideration to bond for road repair/maintenance and we shall be incurring debt for the first time in this decade. County and school taxes will most likely increase, and information on those will be available on your next tax bill issued in August.

Due to past practices of some Liberty Township residents and/or contractors during snow storms it was necessary for the governing body to introduce the following Ordinance at the March 2024 meeting. As a reminder, whether you plow your own driveway or secure a contractor, the homeowner/tenant are responsible for the terms and conditions of this Ordinance.

ORDINANCE #2024.003

SECTION I:

§ 100-22.2. Placing Snow on Plowed Roads Prohibited.


During the periods of snowfall, no person shall throw, shovel, push or blow snow from a driveway onto the main portions of the roads

plowed by the Twp Department of Public Works. Any person violating the provisions of this Section shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to the following fee schedule:

First Offense: – Warning Letter;

Second Offense: – One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) Fine; Third Offense: – Five Hundred Dollar (\$500.00) Fine.

This ordinance took effect 7 March 2024 upon its final passage and publication as provided by law.

Zoning News

Please welcome our new Zoning Officer, George Boesze.

Office hours are Tuesdays, 2:30 – 5:30 pm.

Spring is a popular time for work around the house (i.e., additions, sheds, fences, decks, garages, pools, etc.). A zoning permit is required to make sure the work is approved through the Zoning Office. If it is not, the work would need a variance from the Land Use Board, which is a longer process that requires a public hearing. With the volume of zoning permit applications submitted in the spring and summer, it's good to prepare well in advance of when you'd like the work completed.

There is a new Soil Importation Ordinance for Liberty, requiring a soil import permit prior to bringing in fill to your property for various projects. Make sure the soil you purchase is from a reputable source that can provide a certification of clean fill.

PET WASTE AND WATER POLLUTION



Liberty Township has adopted and enforces an ordinance that requires immediate and proper disposal of solid pet waste. Pet waste is carried by rain, melting snow, and ice to storm drains that empty into rivers and Mountain Lake. Pollution due to pet waste negatively impacts swimming, boating and fishing in our lake. Pet waste contains microorganisms that can cause bacterial diseases, roundworms, and parasitic infections. In addition, pet waste contains harmful levels of nutrients which promote excess algae and plant growth. This can rob Mountain Lake of oxygen potentially killing all aquatic life in the area. Such nutrient pollution also causes Mountain Lake to become cloudy and green. For more information see;

Lead-based Paint Inspections for Rental Dwelling Units

If you are a landlord and rent out a dwelling, you are required to test for lead-based paint by July 22, 2024. The method of inspection for Liberty Township is a visual inspection. If lead-based paint hazards are identified, the owner of the dwelling shall remediate the hazards through abatement or lead-based paint hazard control mechanisms. Property owners must also report all tenant turnover activity to the municipality. Lastly, property owners must provide a copy of N.J.A.C. 5:28A, any lead-safe certifications, and the accompanying guidance document, Lead-Based Paint in Rental Dwellings, to any prospective owners of the dwelling during the real estate transaction, settlement, or closing.

Recreation Commission (LTRC)

A boat launch is available on Lakeside Drive West and a \$5 fee is imposed to anyone that uses the launch. Envelopes and fee box are located right at the launch site.

Stormwater Pollution: What Do You Think?

- You may think littering is no big deal (it is)
- You may think that whatever runs into the storm drains gets treated before it reaches local rivers and streams (it isn't)
- You may think motor oil and other hazardous materials doesn't harm the water very much (it does)

Pollution seeps into the ground and is carried by stormwater (rain and snow) directly to our drinking waters, streams, lakes and oceans. Contaminated stormwater is the #1 cause of water pollution in New Jersey. Simple things, like proper clean-up after oneself and careful use of chemicals in the home, office and yard, are helpful ways for businesses and residents to protect the water.

Stormwater Management

As of 1 January 2023, the State of New Jersey has reclassified Liberty Township from a Tier B to a Tier A municipality. This reclassification means all of New Jersey municipalities are now subject to permitting obligations dictated by federal regulations, which include more stringent requirements set forth in the Clean Water Act.

The MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) permitting program is required by both federal and state regulations to address water quality, as well as flooding concerns related to poor design and improper maintenance.

Liberty Township was required to create a WIP (Watershed Improvement Plan) to address nonpoint source pollution.

- 1) Fourteen (14). One for each of the 12 Congressional Districts and 2 for each of the US Senate Seats.
- 2) Republican won 16 times and Democrat won 15 times.
- 3) According to the National Weather Service, 26-27 December, 1947, Long Branch, NJ recorded 29.7 inches of snow during a 24-hour period.
- 4) The greatest 24-hour rainfall was 14.81 inches in Tuckerton, NJ on 19-20 August, 1939.
- 5) Starting 1921, Atlantic City hosted the event each year until 2004. It returned 15 September 2013 for the last time.
